Presidents Address

Question: What nationality is the Irish Wolfhound? There are no prizes for the correct answer but a great many of us feel that there is a lot to be lost by the incorrect answer, namely, the one being promoted by The Kennel Club (England). The F.C.I., and The American Kennel Club.

I don't know what basis foreign kennel clubs have for claiming that the origin of the breed, or that of the breed standard, is Great Britain. (They have laid claim to five of our seven Irish breeds: The Irish Wolfhound, The Irish Terrier, The Kerry Blue Terrier, The Glen of Imaal Terrier and The Soft Coated Wheaten Terrier. The case for the others

will be taken up by their respective breed clubs.)

It is difficult to believe that it needs to be elucidated to anyone that the Irish Wolfhound is Irish — but apparently such is the case. We have abundant written evidence starting in 391 A.D. with the well known quotation "seven Irish dogs which all Rome viewed with wonder and fancied they must have been brought hither in iron cages." (391 A.D. Quintus Arelius Symmachus, a Roman Counsul writing to his brother Flavianus.) About 1336 King Edward III, sent his huntsmen to bring him Wolfdogs from Ireland. About 1562 Queen Elizabeth I received some from Shane O'Neill. For detailed documentation on the breed in their native country and their continuous exportation abroad down the centuries please read THE IRISH WOLFDOG by Fr. Edmund Hogan S. J. & Capt. G. Graham. This book is available from the I.W.C. of Ireland (price £10.00) and the I.W.C. of America.

Fr. Hogan, S. J. writes: "On Captain Graham's efforts, Mr. R. D. O'Brien, son of the late Mr. W. Smith O'Brien, who is himself a breeder of Irish Wolfdogs, wrote to me on the 8th July, 1887: 'RICHARDSON IN 1840-1, PROVED WHAT THE REAL TYPE WAS. He collected and continued the breed, and handed down not only the authentic tradition but the actual blood to Sir John Power of Kilfane; Sir John, and Mr. Baker of Ballytobin, and Mr. Mahony of Dromore, were the last Irishmen found to devote real pains to the breed. ECM. remember that half the population of Ireland died or emigrated following the 1845-8 famine). The lamp, however was not suffered to fall to the ground, for in the year 1862-3, an Englishman, Captain Graham of Rednock, Dursley, who was a friend of Sir John Power's, took up the subject and

pursued it with characteristic energy.

He obtained specimens from the strains of Ballytobin and Kilfane, and has since kept up a constant inquiry for whatever animals could show a descent from the right Irish blood. With the help of some judicious outcrosses, chiefly with the Scotch deerhound, he has, in spite of an unusual series of misfortunes, succeeded in raising the race to a form much superior to that in which he found it."

Irish Wolfhound breeders will always be deeply grateful to Capt. Graham, that dedicated fancier of our ancient hound who for so many centuries had not only been the pride of the leaders of Ireland but had long been the very symbol of the country of its origin. Capt. Graham gave invaluable assistance at a time when the breed (for various world conditions) was at a dangerously low population. In his valiant determination to pump new vigour into the breed, he quite wisely centred his campaign where the most and the best of the breed were still to be found — in their native country.

In pursuit of this policy Graham sought out individually the top breeders scattered throughout Ireland. He spent much time discussing the breed with them in every detail, learning and confirming his knowledge all the time. He used their lines to form the basis of his breeding. As a result of these meetings and discussions, what was to become the basis of an agreed standard was drawn up. The Standard is in effect what the Irish breeders had followed for the past 2,000 years

and continue to follow to the present day.

Graham did not invent The Irish Wolfhound. He went to where the breed originated, spent time talking to the knowledgeable breeders and then, an only then, consolidated the total knowledge, experience and wisdom into what to-day is known as the Standard. The important point to remember is that the source of the information pertaining to the breed was found in Ireland and brought back to England. Graham came to Ireland for his knowledge, he came to Ireland for his lines and it was The Irish Kennel Club who first put on classes for the breed in 1879. (See A. K. Doyle's article in this same issue). Graham never tried to persuade anyone that ours was an English breed. On the contrary, he wrote copiously, proving beyond any doubt that his were from the true ancient lines of Ireland.

Graham himself fully documents his work with Irish lines as does the Rev. Edmund Hogan S. J. More recently the work is more concisely described in 1937 I. W. Society Year Book and from that I quote: (the breeders mentioned in the

following extract were all Irish),

"The type on which Graham was working owes its continued existence to a succession of previous lovers of the breed, without any single one of whom it might have failed to survive. Beginning with Hamilton Rowan, who died in 1834, and was said in his lifetime to possess 'the last of the Irish Wolfdogs, we find the work carried on immediately after Hamilton Rowan's death by Mr. Carter, of Loughlinstown: from Carter the strain was taken up by Richardson in Dublin. and carried on till 1842, when it came into the hands of Sir John Power, of Kilfane, who kept it through the famine years of 1846 and 1848, up till the 1870's. I rom his strain one or two daughter strains originated, including that of Mr. Baker of Ballytobin, and it was from Power's and Baker's strains that Graham obtained his foundation stock. Graham was acquainted with Carter, and this is no doubt the source of some of his information, though Carter at the time had long ceased to possess any hounds.

Another strain tracing to Sir John Power's Stock is that of the Mahony, or O'Mahony family, from which Dean O'Brien's hounds were derived, though Graham failed to obtain specimens of this strain.

Graham's vowed object was to recover the old Irish breed in the form he considered it 'was, and should be'."

Sue & Miles Rathbone-Scott-Tullygirvan

A dream was realised when Sue & Miles showed their first hound, BALLYKELLY MADIGAN, in 1968. Madigan, a red son of Ballykelly Cavin x Ballykelly Tralee, was a much loved pet and guardian of the Rathbone-Scott children — a job he adored.



Mr. Miles Rathbone-Scott, Comber, had the assistance of his Irish Wolfhound Shaun in looking after his family—Carol (2½) and 7-months-old twins Damien and Ewan—at Bangor Canine Show on Saturday.

The Rathbone-Scott children have attended shows from the time Madigan made his debut. In 1970, their first bitch COLEEN OF RICKENHORE was acquired from Betty Murphy. A very beautiful hound, daughter of Ch. Connel of Nendrum x Ballykelly Achara. Coleen soon proved herself in the show ring making her championship; she became top winning Irish Wolfhound and Annual Champion for 1973. Her wins include Best in Show at our first Club Specialty.

Ch. Coleen produced an exciting litter by Madigan which included the lovely BRIG- and SINFAD. Sinead won Best Puppy under Mary Jane Ellis at the Irish Kennel Club Golden Jubilee show on 17th March, 1972. Her dam, Ch. Coleen, won the brood bitch trophy. In order to bring new blood lines to the kennel, Ch. Coleen was taken to England in 1974 to Int. Ch. Petasmeade Chieftain of Brabyns. This mating produced TULLYGIRVAN FINGAL, a very sound typical red/brindle, a Green Star and Best of Breed winner. He also went Best of Breed at the Hound Club of N. Ireland. His litter sister Tullygirvan Miss Grace is an American Champion.

Delighted with the results of Coleen's litter, in 1975 Sue & Miles again took to the high seas, this time with Tullygirvan Brig on the long journey to Ch. Fintan of Eaglescrag. Brig whelped the glorious Betsy Caolan and her brother Drumeath. Betsy grew on to become a legend, a most beautiful hound.

She was the Top Winning Irish Wolfhound in Ireland in 1978 & joint winner in 1979. She became an English champion in 1979 making her an International Champion, the first Irishbred female to achieve this in 15 years. Betsy was mated to Int. Ch. Carrokeel Coillte Merlin and from this litter Tully-girvan Liadain is just starting her show career.

Always anxious to obtain fresh bloodlines for their Kennel, Sue & Miles purchased Minerva of Nendrum from Miss Twyman. This bitch suited the Tullygirvan lines and was mated to Int. Ch. Betsy's full brother, Tullygirvan Mossbank. The puppies Mulroy and Crana were retained. These exciting youngsters augur well for the future of the Tullygirvans. Both won their puppy class at the 1980 Club Specialty show and both have gone on to win Best of Breed at Open shows. Mulroy won Best Puppy in show at the Irish Breeds Championship show 1980.

The Tullygirvan hounds are a family affair, the children take an active interest helping at home and at shows. The hounds have appeared on T.V. in advertisements. Miles and the hounds were an important part in the world premiere of the Irish play THE QUEEN'S O'NEIL at the Arts Theatre Belfast 1980.

Annual General Meeting

Held at Power's Hotel, Dublin on 15th November, 1980.

The meeting opened and the Chairman called for one minutes silence for members who had died during the year: Mrs. Ruth Harper, Ballygran I.W., Mr. Norman Walker, Reeklaw I.W., and Mrs. Ina O'Shea, U.S.A.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The President explained the change of officers—she said that she had agreed to stand as Chairman to allow Miss Murphy more time for private work she had in hand.

She congratulated Mr. & Mrs. Kelly on the success of Nutstown King in the U. K. She was very pleased with the good results obtained by Irish dogs in the U.K. and abroad generally.

She expressed appreciation to Tony Redmond for his excellent work as show secretary over the past number of years. Tony is taking a break from committee for a few years and Jim Behan has taken over from him.

Miss Twyman emphasised that we should keep breeding carefully and that choice of pedigree was very important if the improvement in the standard of Irish dogs was to be maintained.

CLUB BADGE

Mrs. Scott asked for the position regarding the Club badge. The Chairman explained that the design which had been used had not turned out as well as expected — it was felt by the majority that a full profile would look better than the oblique view used. As there was no possibility of having the new design ready for the AGM, it was decided to leave it to the incoming committee.

RULE BOOK

Mr. Rathbone-Scott asked about the up-dating of the Rule Book – the Secretary advised the meeting that she had been unable to find any changes apart from the Associate Membership, the cancellation of Life Membership and the amendment of the Standard to clarify the 'Bite'.

Mrs. Rathbonc-Scott suggested that new rules would be found in the minutes of a meeting held at a Wynn's Hotel some years ago and the Secretary agreed to research this point.

Mr. Redmond proposed that the incoming committee give first priority to size of rings as they were far too small at the majority of shows. Miss Twyman suggested that the final decision on the suitability of rings rests with the judge and he should be approached if the ring was too small. The IKC regulation minimum size is 40 feet x 30 feet.

Mr. Des McKenna, Mrs. Maureen Holmes, Mr. Miles Rathbone-Scott, Mrs. Scott and many others took part in the discussion about the size of rings and what measures should be taken when they were not big enough. It was decided to send a letter to all show Secretaries stating that unless we get rings of adequate size we will not bring our dogs in for competition. There was discussion on the present low entries in shows and it was the feeling of the Club that the size of rings and cost of petrol were part of the reason. It was stated that the I.K.C. has no plans in future for champion classes.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Treasurer submitted his accounts showing a balance in the accumulated fund of £407.04.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Secretary reported 29 new associate members during the year, 7 from overseas and 22 from Ireland and the U.K.

The Club show had been a success, especially the auction in aid of Club funds.

Our thanks were due to Mr. Bremner for a very enjoyable Get-together at his home last Summer.

She reported that there had been quite a steady demand for sets of old Club magazines, particularly from overseas.

She also reported that Mr. & Mrs. Rathbone-Scott had donated a special-points cup in memory of their Champion Tullygirvan Betsy Caolan.

CHANGE OF RULES

Deletion of Life Members.

The committee recommended that Life Membership be dicontinued because of the long-term cost involved. This was accepted by the membership.

MAGAZINE

The printing of the magazine was discussed and it was agreed that the cost was too high, mainly due to the fact the that the last issue had been almost double the normal size. In addition to cutting down the size it was suggested that a charge should be made to all members. Mr. Rathbone-Scott opposed this and suggested an increase in the subscription instead. Mrs. Givot proposed that from 1st July 1981 the subscription should be increased by £1.00. This was carried

HOGAN/GRAHAM BOOK

It was agreed that the price of the Hogan/Graham book should be increased to £10.00.

Rescue Fund

Kathleen Kelly

The Irish Wolfhound Rescue fund was founded in 1976. It was a decision the Club had to make as some people were over-breeding and selling puppies to buyers who did not realize how much it cost to feed a Wolfhound. By the time the hound was two years old they found they could no longer afford to feed or care for it. Additionally, it may have outgrown its restricted area and may even have finished up in the Dogs & Cats Home.

While we know that there are a minor number who, through change of circumstances, come up for rescue the majority seem to be the result of insufficient care and attention on the part of the seller to make more certain that the buyer appreciates what owning a hound requires.

This is a responsibility that rests on all of our shoulders, not only to be far more careful and selective of where our hounds are going, but also to make a greater effort and to participate more in the rescue operation which should be shared by all of us and not be the burden of only a few.

One good idea that has come to our attention has been done in England where the Club financed the construction of a kennel and run in an existing boarding kennels. Any rescued hounds are brought there until such time as suitable homes can be found for them. The Club pays only for their food and they are cared for during their stay by the resident personnel at no cost to the Club. When there are no rescue hounds to occupy the kennel, it is available to the proprietor for his commercial use.

Please give this serious thought and if you have any ideas on the subject, let us hear from you.

GREEN STAR VALUES

The low value of present Day Green Stars was discussed. It was felt that the index on which the values were based was too high. Miss Murphy stated she had written to the IKC and Mrs. Holmes reported on the Green Star Committee. Mr. Doyle suggested that we should take a firm line with the IKC and write and request an explanation of the formula for Green Star values and how the present index was arrived at. This would have the full backing of the AGM and the matter should be left to the incoming committee.

Mr. S. O'Dwyer proposed that we have a draw to aid Club funds. He suggested a trip to Crufts, to include airfare, two nights in hotel and £25 to spend. This was agreed upon.

LETTER FROM BELGIUM

From F. Van de Wal:

Living in a small rural village near Antwerp (port of Belgium), I had my first IW in 1974, "Scan of Era-Ville" (Boroughbury Justice x Ailin of St. Doulaghs). People didn't know what they were seeing — a long-tailed, big dog and just a pup, jumping like a horse, often surprising himself with his own pranks and half-grown clumsiness. At this moment he is 7 years old and a Belgian Champion.

A few years later I had a bitch sent over, "Carrokeel Aoife of Annervale", which died in 1980 of cancer.

But in between I bought myself "Blat of Bearnabuie". A nice, elegant bitch. Very friendly, often too friendly, but a show girl like no other. She's got that imploring look around her eyes which no one can resist, but that can change in an instant, if necessary. She gets on well with Sean.

All the neighbourhood called a me a fool standing there alone with two big dogs, so very expensive — but what is money compared with those two?

After a few years I suddenly saw another IW in the neighbourhood, and naturally stopped my car. So I asked these people last week to write a little article too, and here it is, by Mr. & Mrs. Vendenbusche-Punt:

"When Cheva, the youngest of a litter of IWs came in, now about two years ago, she suddenly jumped up on us with her forelegs outstretched, one paw for each of us. It was touching; a four month old pup who didn't wish to show any preference for either of us. At this moment it is still the same. In the evenings she changes her affection between us by constantly moving between the empty chairs near both of

Dolly came in one hour later. With a deep growl, for her three months, she showed clearly that she wasn't to be trifled with. However, in the end she became the most obedient dog we know, 'Heel', 'Sit', 'Stay', and all kinds of things she carried out perfectly, except when we wanted to try

them both together on their obedience.

We were out walking when suddenly some cyclists passed accompanied by a Dobermann. Our order, "Heel", was executed immediately, although the desire to run after the funny dog was very great; but by praising them continuously they stayed where they were. When all the group had passed far enough away (some 100 metres) I gave the delivering word, 'Free'. Like a rocket they ran after the desired friend. It turned my stomach, and my throat was hoarse, and my dogs were far away to the frightened cyclists. We don't need to tell you that everything turned out very friendly.

Elton, now one year, came to our place when he was a 2 month old pup. He soon turned out to be a very intelligent boy who learned his lessons within the shortest time i.e. only

taking food on one special code word.

This disproves for me, the prejudiced opinion that you can't have an obedient Irish Wolfhound. They are three darlings all together and try to do their utmost to make us

happy (and vice versa).

So, dear friends in Eire, you see our companions, 'gentle when stroked, fierce when provoked', are on the increase. However, I hope this increase in numbers will not spoil the quality of our Irish Wolfhounds by some commercial breeders.

Ballykelly Dalkey, we are using Miss E Murphy's book RAISING SHOWING AND BREEDING THE IRISH WOLFHOUND as our bible and sticking strictly to the Standards published therein. Our idea is to get the Irish back into the Irish Wolfhounds in South Africa. A few seen recently definitely seem to have lost some of the original strain as laid down by the Standards. We owe a lot of our success and keenness to the good work and encouragement from Mrs Timmy Ralfe, owner of the sirc of our Wolfies who also gives us classes in training our puppies from 'Liseune Cormack & Ratherin Macknee of Mpani.

Mrs. Arsennis, the breeder, also keeps strong contact with all her youngsters, and regularly attends classes with Danny Boy' one of the first litter who has just made Reserve Champion to his mother's championship at Capetown last week.

The Standard

My original intention was to write regarding the F.C.I.'s and The Kennel Club's declaration that Great Britain is the

country of origin for the Irish Wolfhound.

The stupidity of this statement can be shown up from Capt. Graham's written account and the fact that it was the Irish Kennel Club that first put on Classes for the breed in Dublin in 1879 and again in 1880. The next appearance of Irish Wolfhounds was at the English Kennel Club show London 1881. At this show Irish Wolfhounds were listed under the caption FOREIGN DOGS I would take this as their opinion that they accepted the breed not to be of English origin!

However, worse was to come, that was the shock I had when I received the Agenda for the A.G.M. of the I.W.C. (of England). It made my blood boil to read that following a letter from the English Kennel Club, that the committee of the I.W.C. propose the Breed Standard be altered to read: "General Appearance . . . in general type is a rough coated greyhound-like breed".

What does that mean? A LURCHER? It is obvious from seeing the many inferior English hounds turned out by the new get rich quick merchants, how difficult it has been for them to breed according to the original 1884 standard. If this new "thing" is adopted, it will be a licence for them to grind out all kinds of horrors, and to treat serious breeders of standing who have worked from Graham's Standard as if they were the guilty party. I hope and implore that our Club won't be fooled and its members "follow my leader". We in

Ireland have been faithful to Capt. Graham's Standard and have produced magnificent hounds, able to hold their own against all commers. I beg all lovers of the Great Hounds of Ireland to refrain from messing around with the Standard. Let's be proud of it and the stock that have been bred according to it and work with our Standard to breed even better hounds.

IW registrations have increased rather a lot lately. Some of them are imports, mostly from England. But last year one came from Ireland, a male puppy from the Nutstown kennel (Carrokeel Sir Connel of Nutstown x Sheba of Garrow). He is still very young, but we are looking forward to seeing him growing up. He was imported by S. Carlsson.

There are two males here but they are veterans, my own Dunleary Patrick (Cormac of Gulliagh x Ir Ch Fior Slaine of St. Doulaghs) and C. Ebbesson's Ch Conor McNessa of St. Doulaghs (Am Ch Cara of St. Doulaghs x Dunleary Grainne). Patrick has never had any puppies but Conor has had some. The most famous is Int and Nord Ch Flannon Connel, born 1975, owner Miss V. Larsen. Flannon Connel's mother is Nord Ch Wenwils Maggie McClusky. He was top winning dog all breeds in Norway 1977, and multiple best in show winner in specialties both in Norway and Sweden. Unfortunatley he has no offspring. Martinel of Newtownhill is litter sister of Beau Flynn and Moonbeam of Newtownhill, and is good at obedience. As far as I know she has not been bred.

Cushla of Tolkavalley (Ir Ch Boroughbury Justice x Tully-Sweden, three daughters and a son. The daughters are my own Petasmeade Amber, Nord Ch Petasmeade Jade and their half sister Petasmeade Sapphire. There is also a brother of Jade. This Irish line is living on in Sweden, although it is via England. Jade and Amber's sire is Ch Petasmead Oberon, and Sapphire's is Petasmeade Ross.

Ir and Nord Ch Ballykelly Reamonn has a daughter here imported from Norway. She is M and M Hansson's Ch Gillyflower of Kroodden (Dam, Jude of Kroodden), and she has some promising puppies.

Finland

The very first Irish Wolthounds in Finland were imported from England in the early thirties. Their names were Skyline Stroma and I innea of Brabyns and mated they produced some offspring, which faded out entirely when the war began. During the ensuing years there were some efforts to start the breed anew. It was in 1966 we can say that we first established the breed in Finland. First examples were from Ireland, Norway and Sweden and ever since the registration numbers have

been about 35-50 a year.

In 1969 we founded our club "Suomen Irlanninsusikoirat", at the beginning there were just a handful of enthusiasts and now we have about 200 members (family members included) covering 90% of IW owners here in Finland. For members we arrange summer and winter meetings. The club magazine is published 3-4 times a year and with our Scandinavian neighbours (Sweden and Norway) we have established good connections. The stock we now have here in Finland varies very much. We have some old Finnish lines (that means late sixties) based mainly on Ballykelly Mulrooney (Ballykelly Cavin/Ballykelly Tralee) who at that time sired almost all bitches (which still were few).

In 1973 our present chairman, Ingmar Ehrlund brought from Ireland a male puppy, Ballykelly Rogan (Bernard of Cordoogan/Ch. Ballykelly Molly Mulligan), which grew to be one of the best IWs in Finland. He was best of breed numerous times both in Finland and Sweden and best IW in Finland in two successive years. He got his title Nordic Champion and Winner-77. He sired some litters with Finnish bred bitches. but unfortunately his litters have been small and few. However from him have come some of the best Finnish bred bitches called Jolanda, Josefina and Janina. (all Finnish Champions). Rogan is now almost 8 years and retired both from showrings and breeding. His impact in IW breeding in Finland has been very good and Rogan himself has been a very good example of IW to Finnish judges and public both from at home and abroad. He has been a wonderful character full of goodwill for all of us.

In 1977 Merja Viertokangas imported Athcarne Bran (Gwernyfed Leigus of Carrokcel/Ch Athcarne Shiofra), who very easily attained his championship and is Winner-81. Bran has now been the most successful IW in Finland for two years and if his health continues as it is now he will have no difficulties in winning a third time. Hitherto he has won 7 CACIBs from Finland and mostly he has been the best of breed. He has sired three litters (two with Rogan's daughters) and with the eldest of his offspring now about 2½ years there are already six champions and many others near their championship. His progeny have some typical features like heads carried high, excellent hindquarters and good balanced bodies with good movement. Expression too seems to come from

the father.

Tapio Marin brought Marion of Nendrum (Ch. Eaglecrag Toby/Clodag of Eaglescrag). At the moment their progeny is Carrokeel Taisce (Gwernyfed Leigus of Carrokeel/Ch. Boroughbury Jolly). Both bitches are Finnish champions, both are shown in Scandinavia with good results and now both being over three years old they are so similar to each other that even the family cannot say which is which if their heads are not seen. They are tall, strong and very, very typical IWs with a lot of elegance.

Marion was mated with Eaglescrag Viking (Eaglescrag Toby/Clodag of Eaglescrag) at the moment their progeny is 10 months old. They have very much of their parents. They are tall, strongly built with good heads, dark eyes and very nice expression. They are very promising young IWs.

About Taisce we cannot yet say so much because she is just coming to show us her abilities in producing a litter next June (81).

Every now and then we get some imports from England, Sweden and Norway, but they have not affected our stock as they have not been used. After Rogan we have our hopes on Bran, Marion and Taisce concerning the improvement of the breed in Finland. Unfortunately we have some "puppymills" which produce the lion's share of all puppies — puppies which never will be good Irish Wolfhounds. Mostly they are too light in bone, have light eyes, bad mouths and some bad characters.

But still what happens here is in small scale compared even with Sweden, where they register each year about 150 IWs. Irish Wolfhounds now seem to be in fashion and we are fully aware of those hazards and in our club try to get people to understand that it is far preferable to use better IWs in breeding and forget the worst ones.


It remains to be seen what will happen here in future as a whole, but some of us in any case are trying very hard to get IWs established a bit further not in quantity but hopefully in quality!

It therfore behoves all Judges of this breed to see that the unsound hound never receives a place in any class; it is being much better to make no award than to give a prize to a hound that may be largely used for perpetuating cripples.

In the breeding of Irish Wolfhounds the same principles apply as in the breeding of all other dogs, namely, only to breed from the best possible strain available, and from only the soundest of the breed.

As regards the bitch, the writer is strongly of opinion that only bitches of well-matured age should be used, as Wolfhounds do not reach maturity till two years old... The choice of a suitable stud is especially important in his breed, as, owing to the in-breeding that has been necessary in the past, many of our breeders use dogs too closely related to the bitches. An all-round sound dog of medium height, is far preferable to an overgrown, badly-shaped, crooked-legged giant, for size, though most important, cannot in any way make up for unsoundness. In the past the use of crooked-legged dogs was pardonable, but now it is absolutely inexcusable."

Graham on Soundness

Graham writes: "A firm stand must be made against awarding prizes to hounds that are not absolutely sound, as the breed is essentially a galloping one, and meant for rough as well as fast work; and therefore coat, soundness of limb, and freedom of action, must be insisted on. Girth is also most essential, as without it, the necessary lung and heart action is impossible.

The writer knows by experience how hard it is to judge freedom of action in the show ring, as he has seen hounds which he knows, from having watched them gallop over a country, to be perfect in this respect, taken direct from their cramped benches, where perhaps they have been for 16 hours and possibly a long railway journey as well, and brought into a show ring some 20 feet square and their necessarily stiff action adversely commented upon. The longer-bodied the hound, the more he is affected, but it is not difficult to detect crooked legs, weak hind-quarters, want of coat, bad feet and legs and unsoundness generally, and the writer is glad to think that in the present day a hound showing these defects, stands but little chance of becoming a 'Champion'.

Though a 'Champion' is not necessarily a better dog to breed from than a non-Champion dog, yet he generally is, and especially is he so to the majority of breeders who will not think for themselves, and therefore use a hound 'because he is a champion'.

Additional Interesting Extracts From The Same Article

Most of the information in this 16 page article is already known to us from the Hogan/Graham book THE IRISH WOLFDOG is available from The Irish Wolfhound Club of Ircland and The Irish Wolfhound Club of America. Price from I.W.C. of Ireland £10.00.

Graham mentions the source of the motto "Gentle when stroked, fierce when provoked". "Irish history is full of the doings of the Wolfdog, or Mil-chu, as the ancient Irish Chieftains called them.... They appear as the supporters on the arms of the ancient Kings of Ireland with the motto "Gentle etc.".

He dates their importation into many countries. "About 1336 King Edward III, sent his huntsmen to bring him Wolfdogs from Ireland, to hunt the wolves that were causing such destruction in England." (We know that the sons of Uisneach took 150 hounds with them in their flight from Ulster to Scotland in the first century). Some were sent to Spain in 1545, in 1592 "King Henry the Great of France wrote to Ireland for some to help him hunt wild boars". They were also sent as presents to the Kings of Sweden, Denmark, Persia, France, Spain and India. He dates those sent to Sweden at 1678, more being sent to Spain at the same time. (Elsewhere we find Penant 1776-81 writing: "These dogs are now entirely rare, the late King of Poland have procured as many as possible of them".)

Graham describes the breed as follows: "Irish Wolfhounds should somewhat resemble the Scotch Deerhound, but should be much taller, heavier, and more massive. They should be active and fast, but of course their weight prevents their being absolutely as fast as the Deerhound. Their necks should be thick in comparison to their form and very muscular, and they should have a long body and frame. Their heads should be long but not narrow, coming to a comparative point towards the nose; the nose itself should be rather large, the head gradually getting broader up to the back of the skull; not sharp up to the eyes and then suddenly broad and lumpy, as is often the case with dogs bred between Greyhound and Mastiff. Thre can be no doubt that from the very nature of the work which the Wolfhound was called upon to do, his coat should be rough and somewhat shaggy in nature."

Note the emphasis Graham always places on correct coat, both here and in the earlier section on Soundness. Imagine how horrified he would be if the could have foreseen the absolutely non typical woolly or silky coats creeping into our breed to-day.

Note too, that he emphasises "long body and frame". The 'normal' frame made by a dog's body is square: e.g. in a Beagle, the height to withers and full length of body should be approximately equal. This build permits the 'normal' stride where the fore and hind legs do not reach as far back or forward as the centre of the body. The slightly longer body of the Irish Wolfhound allows the typical longer stride when the back foot should land on the mark made by the front foot. Thus it is not true, as some all-round breeders say, that the body should be the same shape as that of other dogs but with a longer second thigh.

To those interested in reading up on conformation, etc. may 1 recommend R. H. Smythe's THE CONFORMATION OF THE DOG or his THE DOG, STRUCTURE AND MOVEMENT. I am assuming most people have already read McDowell-Lyon's THE DOG IN ACTION. It is a good idea to read such all-breed books right through, even if only skimming through them first – then to read them in depth. The book in general will cover basic conformation, anatomy etc and deals separately with galloping breeds and other breeds built for special work.

Descriptions and illustrations of the Trophies are taken from THE IRISH WOLFHOUND SOCIETY YEAR BOOKS 1937 and 1938. Their rules and recommendations state: "All trophies shall be held for one year, and returned at the end of recommendations."





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Mrs. Ruth Harper —Ballygran Irish Wolfhounds

It is with great sadness that we record the passing of Mrs. Harper, owner of The Ballygran Irish Wolfhounds. Mrs. Harper was a lady of great charm and kindness, a sportswoman in the true sense, a breeder of bloodstock—her horses were famous. To Irish Wolfhounds she brought a knowledge of conformation, soundness, bloodlines and, above all, a profound love.

Mrs. Harper was remarkable in so far that although only six litters of Ballygran hounds were bred, the first in 1954, their influence on the breed worldwide was enormous. Her first female, the beautiful Gail of Boroughbury, was 35 install and almost white. Gail was a daughter of Murphy of Bradfield x Tana of Boroughbury. Mated to Ch. Molony of Ballykelly, she produced Tana, Cavan, Killala, Brenda, Flynn, Cloughran and Sheelagh (all of Ballygran). Cavan went to Miss Seale and sired many outstanding hounds: Ballykelly Rooney, the dain of Ch. Ballykelly Ni Rooney and Int. Ch.

Flynn went to America where he became a champion. Many great hounds there are descended him him. Brenda went to Mrs. Tyrrell and founded the Dunamaise Kennel.

Tana was later mated to Ch. Brannigan of Ballykelly producing the second Ballygran litter which included: Ch. Bridget and Moreen, two outstanding females of great size and soundness who contributed greatly to the breed. Moreen was the dam of the beautiful Jan, himself a great stud dog of type and soundness. Jan's brother Rory became "SHAWN" the mascot of the Irish Guards, London. Gilda and Borlie went to America where they became champions and bred champions. Denagh and Little Mo remained in Ireland and are behind most of the best Irish stock.

In writing the history of Irish Wolfhounds in Ireland, a great debt of gratitude is due to Mrs Harper for her foresight in breeding from only the soundest and most beautiful hounds. ALL the Ballygran's were family pets and adored by their mistress.

A gentle lady has left us, her passing is especially hard for those who knew and loved her. Yet through her Ballygran hounds, long will she be remembered.



Swords and District Canine Society Championship Show — 21st June, 1980

It was a great pleasure to go over a very nice entry of Irish Wolfhounds in this their native country. I had some really excellent hounds but, here as elsewhere, there is a tendency to produce hounds lacking elegance - too square and heavy with short flat backs Breeders must bear in mind that this is a sight hound which must be tall and impressive, not short and squat. They must have enough length of back to give a nice arch over the loin, and enough length of neck of neck to carry the typical, lovely Irish Wolfhound head with neat, small, well-folded ears, dark, gentle eyes and a long, strong foreface. There are far too few of these to be seen anywhere these days.

1. Killykeen-Doyle & Marchment's KILLYKEEN MR. GERRY. A very nice type of good size, correct length of back, a very good head and expression, good hindquarters but rather straight in stifle.

Redmond's ATHCARNE CATHAL. Very promising, sound and charming, only 6 months old, excellent quarters, good body and back, a bit short in foreface.

1. Walton's TOLKAVALLEY DUN ANGUS. A good coat, correct back and topline, sound but he carries his tail too high and his ears are too big.

Limit Dog:

- 1. Redmond's ATHCARNE FINTAN. Correct earw, good back and topline, correct quarters, nice coat, a bit short in the foreface. Reserve Green Star.
- Walton's TOLKAVALLEY MERLIN OF NENDRUM. Sound but too square and fat, rather short on the leg.

Open Dog:

- 1. Finney's INT. CH. CARROKEEL COILLTE MERLIN, I have seen this well-known hound looking and moving better. On the day he was carrying too much weight and he did not move with as much verve as I know he can. However, he could not be denied his placing as he is of very good type and very sound with a good head, and correct body and quarters, and a correct coat. I would prefer smaller ears. Green Star and Best of Breed.

 2. Bremner's BEAU FLYNN OF NEWTOWN HILL. This
- hound is rather square and loaded in shoulder. His front is not his fortune. Hindquarters are good. A bit short in
- 3. Daly's REAMONN OF MOLL MACHI. Has light eyes, a short foreface and a rather thick neek. Quite a sound mover.

Puppy Bitch:

1. Finney's GULLIAGH BALLYKELLY CAIT. A very promising red brindle. She is sound with excellent body and quarters, correct back, a nice head and expression, nice ears, and a very well-laid shoulder which is so rare. Reserve Green Star.

Novice Bitch:

1. Walton's TOLKAVALLEY OOLA. What a pity this bitch would insist on pacing. She is a nice type, feminine with good quarters.

Graduate Bitch:

1. Finney's GULLIAGH TOLKAVALLEY DOREEN. She is very like her sire, but I would prefer a longer back. She is a bit loaded in the shoulder, has good quarters, carries her tail too high.

2. Walton's TOLKAVALLEY LADY JANE. A sound mover

but a bit short in the leg, and short in foreface.

3. Kelly's SARA OF NUTSTOWN. A nice type with a very good back, correct quarters, nice head and expression, but she refused to move.

Limit Bitch:

- 1. Kelly's FLORRIE OF NUTSTOWN. Well-balanced and sound with good quarters, correct body and coat, and a nice head and ears.
- 2. Bremner's MOONBEAM OF NEWTOWN HILL. Rather short on the leg, and short in foreface.

Open Bitch:

- I. Behan's MARY OF NUTSTOWN, Well-balanced and very sound, excellent movement, a good topline, excellent front and shoulder, a bit light in the eye. Green Star.
- Redmond's CARROKEEL MOONBEAM OF NENDRUM. Excellent quarters, good back and topline, short in the foreface, and her ears are too big
- 3. Kelly's CARROKEEL SLAINTE. Nice head and ears, rather straight in stifles and much too fat.

Munster Canine **Society Show** October, 1980

The show was held in a day-long monsoon, which meant that all judging had to take place indoors. Unfortunately, the makeshift ring was much too small to allow the IWs to show off their movement to advantage; but I enjoyed the day and had some quality hounds to go over. I thought that the general level of soundness was high in both sexes. I would prefer to see more good heads, with better proportions and with that warm expression for which a dark eye is essential. I noted that a couple of dogs out of the small make entry had tails set high. It would be unfortunate if this characteristic becomes established in the breed in Ireland. My thanks to my charming and expert steward, Marion.

Puppy Dog:

- 1. Redmond's ATHCARNE CATHAL. A well-angulated 10month old, moving well. Good reach of neck and plenty of bone. Tail set and carried too high.
- 2. Metcalf's TORC OF MONTAGNE. A light grev pup with some substance. Light-eyed and straight in the stifle. As yet, weak behind.

Yearling Dog:

 Walton's TOLKAVALLEY DUN ANGUS. A substantial, brown brindle with still some way to go. A strong body with good spring of rib, rather long in the back. Moved soundly, particularly coming towards. Will do well when he develops more muscle and drive, and, hopefully, more hind angulation. Nice head with dark eye, though ears too long.

Novice Dog:

 Kaiser's CATHAL OF MOLLMACHIE. Smallish dog. Well-made with powerful quarters and low hocks. Marred by a soft coat, and light eyes.

Open Dog

 Kelly's INT. CH. NUTSTOWN KING. A massive, striking dog with a very strong, deep body and great bone. He has nice length of back and low set tail. His movement is very true, showing a straight column of bones coming and going. Altogether a hound of great quality.

He would be even better with a pound or two less weight. Good hard coat, eyes too light. Green Star, Best of Breed.

Redmond's ATHCARNE FINTAN. Balanced hound with nice front. Moved out well but with high tail. Good hard coat. Rather short faced. Reserve Green Star.

Walton's TOLKAVALLEY MERLIN OF NENDRUM.
 This is a particularly sound one, but unfortunately, very short on the leg and in body. Moves soundly but with limited stride. Very nice head and expression.

Puppy Bitch:

 Kaiser's COLLEEN DUN OF MOLLMACHIE. Nicely balanced pup with good forehand and well laid shoulder. Lovely head. Deep brisket. Moved well.

Yearling Bitch:

- Clarke's COOLBREAGH DEIRDRIU. Wheaten brindle, Good bone and outline. Quarters well muscled and hocks low. Moved well. Rather light eyed.
- Walton's TOLKAVALLEY OLGA. Racy, pale cream bitch with feminine head. Nice hindquarters, but inclined to pin in front. Topline spoilt by pronounced dip behind the shoulders.

Novice Bitch:

- Walton's TOLKAVALLEY DONAGH DUBH. Stylish, well-made, black bitch. Rather on the fine side in substance and head. Broad hips and exceptionally welldeveloped thighs giving impressive drive to movement, which won her an excellent class.
- Kaiser's MAEVE OF MOLLMACHIE. Red brindle with lovely front and head. Ears small and low set. Deep, well-ribbed body. Did not have the angulation of the winner, but a nice type.
- Kelly's SARA OF NUTSTOWN. Immature type bitch. Rather long in the back. Moved out at elbow and close behind, Needs time.

Graduate bitch:

 Walton's TOLKAVALLEY LADY JANE. Substantial wheaten bitch. Good bone and spring of rib. Nice outline with tail low-set over good quarters, which she used well in movement. Head a little plain. Reserve Green Star.

Limit Bitch:

 Clarke's COOLBREAGH ONORA. Reasonably sound, but throws out hind leg in movement. Would like more houndy curves.

Open Bitch:

 Redmond's CARROKEEL MOONBEAM OF NENDRUM. Very well-constructed bitch of the compact type. Good topline with correct rise over loin, fall off and low-set tail. Well angulated with short hocks. Moved nicely coming and going. Good reach of neck and dark eye. Should have a good future, Green Star.

 Clarke's COOLBREAGH ATHCARNE CLODAGH. A very sound, well-proportioned wheaten. Movement easy.

Would prefer less weight to see her at her best.

 Kelly's CARROKEEL SLAINTE. Very solid, substantial bitch. Lovely head and eye. Nice reach of neck. Moved quite soundly. Straightish stifles. Out of coat and overweight.

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


